Life Beyond High School







his fall, Twinsburg High School launched a clear vision for its students involving life after graduation. With the launch of The Academy at Twinsburg High School, that vision involves the three "E's"-Employment, Enlistment or Enrollment.

The Academy at Twinsburg High School is providing new opportunities for students (starting with the Class of 2021) to explore possibilities which prepare them for life after graduation from Twinsburg High School. Partnering with local and regional businesses, organizations and community members, The Academy is able to offer a four-year, diverse program to help guide students in this pursuit. There are three identified pathways students can explore: Business and Manufacturing, Healthcare and Administration, and Human Performance/Recreational Management. Partners include Akron Metro, Reminderville Athletic Club, Wrightside Consulting, the Ohio Department of Education, SSP, Visual Marking Systems, the Twinsburg Chamber of Commerce, the Twinsburg Bulletin, the Ohio Senate and more.

The program kicked off this fall with keynote speaker Will Waller (pictured), Vice President of Human Resources for Goodyear Corp. and a two-time Paralympic medalist in wheelchair basketball. Now, The Academy is offering Twin Talks. During the Twin Talks students and parents have the

All talks are held at Twinsburg High School (unless otherwise indicated) and start @ 7 p.m. opportunity to listen to one of our partners talk about their career, their pathway on how they got there, their business and what other roles are part of their business. Twin Talks are also open to upperclassmen not in the Class of 2021. In conjunction with the Twin Talks at Twinsburg High School, students with a deep interest in the medical field are able to attend talks with business partner Ahuja Medical Center in Beachwood. These talks revolve around various aspects of the medical community.

"To date, we have had our Opening Night Kickoff event and four Twin Talks," said Norm Potter, Curriculum Supervisor. "We have also hosted one medical talk at Ahuja Medical Center. So far, our students have logged 264 hours of time in Academy events and volunteering, and we are seeing parents involved as they are also attending our Twin Talks.'

Much of this program is voluntary and is designed to instill within students what employers are demanding in employability. When students are in attendance at Academy events they are expected to present themselves as an employable person to business and industry partners. Students are also responsible for recording all events they attend and checking in and out of each event with the school representative or designated employee of the business they are involved with for that event.

"Our goal as a District is clearly to prepare our students for life beyond high school. The goals we set for The Academy initially were to have 20 students actively involved and five solid business/organizational partners. At this point, we have far exceeded that number as we have 49 students involved in events and 47 business partners involved. Our community, our partners, our students and their families all recognize the workforce is changing and to be prepared for the three E's, it takes a collaborative effort from everyone in our region," stated Potter.


Twinsburg Receives \$30,000 Grant to Support Student Mental Health

The Twinsburg City School District received \$30,000 in grant funding from the Ohio Mental Health and Addiction Services to expand the District's Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program. The District's goal is to improve safety and positive school climate, enhance social-emotional competence, and provide multiple systems of support for all students.

The District began implementing PBIS within its schools during the 2013-2014 school year and continues to expand elements of the program. While proud of its efforts, the current goal is to strengthen the PBIS program to promote continuity from building-to-building, as well as teaching students positive decision-making and problem-solving skills to enhance readiness for college and career. The District plans to use the funds from this grant to achieve this goal.

In addition to improving students' academic and behavioral outcomes, the District also recognizes the impact of the current opioid epidemic within the state of Ohio and local community. During the 2016-2017 school year, Twinsburg implemented several initiatives to increase awareness regarding opioids, including community outreach and prevention education. The Twinsburg City School District is increasing its prevention education curriculum and community outreach by offering "Movie and Parent Education Nights". These drug and alcohol prevention sessions are being offered through a partnership with Beech Brook. Three sessions have already been offered

two remaining sessions are scheduled for Tuesday, January 16, and Thursday, February 15, from 5:30-7 p.m. at George G. Dodge Intermediate School.

Mindfulness Comes to

Wilcox Primary School







This Fall Wilcox Primary School students and staff started a whole-school morning ritual. Every day at 8:40 am the entire school stops to experience a few minutes of world class music and deep breathing to get the day started in a calm, centered way.

Last June, Principal Lynn Villa participated in a workshop at the Ohio Association of Elementary School Administrators (OAESA) Conference in Columbus and learned how an organization called City Silence (www.citysilence.org) has brought classical music and mindful breathing to schools in the Cincinnati area and how it has impacted brain development, students being able to regulate their emotions, and reduction in negative behavior incidents.

In September, Wilcox staff learned more about Mindful Music Moments from City Silence founder, Stacy Sims, who visited Wilcox Primary School for professional development. Teachers learned how just a few minutes of quiet reflection each day can help people regulate their

Mindful Music Moments has become a part of the culture at Wilcox. Students listen to incredible music from composers like Beethoven, Mozart, Mahler, and Haydn performed by the Cleveland Orchestra. Each piece is repeated daily for five days with a voiceover that gives history about the musical composition and teaches a different type of breathing technique, a way to focus, or offers something to think about when listening to the music.

This four-minute mindfulness ritual has created a sense of community at Wilcox Primary School where everyone experiences the same thing at the same time. Many students have shared that it is their favorite time of the day.

Practice makes Perfect

Approximately 150 eleventh grade students participated in a Practice ACT on November 21, 2017. The free practice test was provided by the Summit Education Initiative to all Summit County high schools. This was an excellent opportunity for the eleventh grade students to prepare for

the February 2018 District administration of the free ACT provided by the Ohio Department of Education.

Patriotic performances at Samuel Bissell

Samuel Bissell Elementary School recognized the sacrifices our Veterans have made for our country on November 20, 2017. Nearly 120 veterans were treated to two patriotic performances under the direction of music teachers Mrs. Thomas and Mrs. Petitte.

Veterans and their families also had the opportunity to spend time together before or after the programs to talk and eat snacks provided by the Samuel Bissell Elementary School PTA.

Second and third grade students dressed in patriotic red, white and blue as they performed

> patriotic songs for their families. The students incorporated hand movements and the use of American Flags into their energetic and lively concerts.













November 10th was a special day at Wilcox Primary School when the school transformed to welcome and honor over 150 active and retired military personnel. The day began with a flag raising and the "Pledge of Allegiance" led by the Twinsburg VFW as the entire school surrounded the flagpole in the front of the school building. Students created art to decorate the halls, the gymnasium was designated as the "canteen" for military guests to have coffee and visit, and the cafeteria became the "mess hall" when it was time for students to eat lunch with their guests.

One of the most moving parts of this annual program is when the music for each branch of the military is played and those who served in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, and Coast Guard are invited to stand and be recognized. Many veterans will wear or bring parts of their uniforms and show their medals to the children.

Veterans' Day continues to be a very important tradition at Wilcox Primary School that makes the service of our nation's military personnel concrete for Twinsburg's youngest students, helping them begin to develop respect for those who have served.



New Scoreboards Provide Students with Real-World Learning Experience

When the Twinsburg City Schools Board of Education approved over \$400,000 in corporate sponsorships for a multimedia project at Tiger Stadium and Twinsburg High School, they didn't just approve state-of-the-art scoreboards. The Board also approved the opportunity for students to gain practical, hands-on multimedia experiences.

In March, the Board approved sponsorship agreements with Cardinal Health, Carpet Country, American Bottle Company-Dr. Pepper Snapple Group, and University Hospitals. This agreement helped fully fund the Multimedia Project, which includes a new full video scoreboard at Tiger Stadium, a full video scoreboard at Twinsburg High School Gymnasium, a stat scoreboard at Twinsburg High School Gymnasium and four large LCD screens outside the Twinsburg High School Auditorium that will allow for events hosted in the auditorium to be simulcast into the Commons.

This upgrade in technology has given students the unique opportunity of managing the digital platforms and gaining practical experiences.

"21 students were selected via an interview process. The selected students were chosen from the THS Interactive Media course at the advanced level, THS students in Cuyahoga Valley Career Center's Media Technology program, and/or THS students who worked on the documentary 'Voices of the Hill," stated Casey Kirtley, who oversees the interactive media and news programs at Twinsburg High School.

Kirtley says that students are involved in all levels of production using professional cameras, the Tricaster for video selection and replays, the Daktronics scoreboard control, creating motion graphics for display on the screens, and directing cameras, all while interconnected via wireless intercom.

"I am most appreciative of our corporate partners and their interest in supporting our students," said Twinsburg Superintendent Kathryn Powers. "Our school community will benefit from the generosity of these sponsorships for years to come."

Chad Welker, who serves as Business Manager for the District, anticipates that over the lifetime of this project the District will generate over \$1 million in additional revenue.

"We continuously look for ways to reduce District expenditures while enhancing our facilities through alternative funding sources such as these sponsorships," said Welker.

As for the students involved in projects related to these multimedia platforms, they are staying busy. According to Kirtley, they are scheduled to simulcast 38 events from the THS Auditorium to the THS Commons this school year. They have been and will be, operating the video scoreboard in the gym for more than 30 sports in the gym (volleyball, girls basketball, boys basketball, and wrestling). This past fall they covered close to 20 events at the Tiger Stadium (football, boys soccer, girls soccer, Homecoming parade, and playoff games).

Getting Involved

Students were active in the community and in various extracurricular activities throughout the Fall.

- The Foreign Language Club held its annual canned-food drive in mid-November and collected over 10,000 items to donate to SS. Cosmas and Damian Parish Food Bank.
- THS students produced the Fall drama, "The Desk Set," over a weekend in late November. Senior citizens were treated to an afternoon matinee performance and refreshments with the cast and crew.
- Spearheaded by Jean DiMatteo, a 3D printer was installed in the THS Media Center. Students have been using this device all semester to create 3D objects in what is now known as the THS MakerSpace.

After an exciting and successful Fall sports season, Twinsburg High School celebrated an outstanding team achievement as well as some individual performances. The Girls Soccer Team advanced to the OHSAA District Championship for the first time in school history after defeating Hudson 1-0 in district semi-finals. THS also sent cross country runners Ryan Adkins and Emily O'Connor to compete at the OHSAA State Meet at National Trail Raceway in Hebron in November.

Chromebooks Create World of Possibility for Students, Teachers



Fall semester found Twinsburg High School embarking on the first phase of the District's Chromebook Initiative. Teachers, counselors, and District administrators received their Chromebooks and have begun setting the course for the future of

learning within the Twinsburg City School District.

"Technology is helping to shape what is possible within schools," offered Beth Mariola, Supervisor of Innovative Programs. "Twinsburg High School teachers are utilizing technology to transform their instruction by encouraging students to collaborate and communicate via the G Suite for Education platform, Chrome extensions, and apps that help to make teaching and learning more accessible, efficient, and compelling.'

The rollout began in early September and included a small group of staff members. To meet the individualized needs and interests of each teacher, ongoing professional development has been the primary focus in order to prepare for the student rollout in January 2018.

"The goal is to offer instructional support for each teacher's unique needs, interests, and comfort level with technology," Mariola stated. "This support is not only offered during planning periods and after school, but also during instructional blocks as technology-enhanced strategies may be employed for the first time."

The next phase in the initiative is to roll out Chromebooks for this year's freshmen and sophomores on January 8, 2018, from 12-5 p.m. & January 9, 2018, from 2-7 p.m. in the Twinsburg High School Commons. A parent information meeting was hosted in November with the purpose of providing information related to the instructional benefits of Chromebooks, device care, student/parent responsibilities, and safeguards for students. For those who missed the session, a video featuring the information is available on the District's website at www.twinsburg.k12.oh.us.

"Twinsburg High School teachers continue to work hard at improving their craft-one that is immersed in 21st-century skills which provide students with opportunities to create, collaborate, communicate, think critically, and problem solve," Mariola offered. "Technology will certainly help support this endeavor."

200 Years of Working Together Twinsburg Bicentennial





The community, comprised of the city of Twinsburg, the Village of Reminderville and Twinsburg Township, founded in 1817, recently celebrated its 200th birthday. On August 30, 2017, many Twinsburg City School District staff, students, and their families joined this celebration with a Back-to-School Bicentennial Celebration evening of funfilled events held on the Township's historic town square.

There was no shortage of events. Music was provided by Twinsburg High School Band, the Orchestra Ensemble group, and Great Expectations. A variety of games were stationed throughout the square and Church Street was cordoned off to allow for tattoo and face painting, a Kindness Rocks booth, and a "photo op" selfie station. The Twinsburg Historical Society displayed an array of interesting artifacts, kettle corn was available for purchase to support the THS Band, and the PTA, incentivized students who visited three activities with free snow cones and prizes.

This event rounded out months of preparation and prior programs and activities eight months in the making. In January, students and teachers from Wilcox Primary School, Samuel Bissell Elementary School, and George G. Dodge Intermediate School created "We Are Twinsburg A-Z" books. The laminated, spiral-bound books were on display in the Twinsburg Public Library. A Tiger Spirit Fun Run logo contest was started and the winning design was announced in March and t-shirts were available for participants during the Fun Run. In February, bookmarks were designed and created by students in grades K-6 and made available to the public in April with the help of Twinsburg Public Library. The Kindness Rocks were distributed around our three communities during the month of October.

One Bicentennial attendee summed up the celebration by saying that "200 years of working together has made Twinsburg a great city to live in!"

School Finance

As state legislators continue to wrestle with issues of funding public education, we know there are no quick fixes or easy solutions coming from the state or federal government. Numerous State funding models, legislative bills, charter schools, and expanding voucher programs are constantly eroding public education funding and negatively impacting our educational programming. In spite of legislative activities, local taxpayers will continue to shoulder the responsibility of providing quality education for the children in our community. Children with diverse needs, abilities, backgrounds, cultures, and requirements continue to come through the doors of our schools each day asking and deserving to be educated. Our Schools - Our Kids.

The property tax levy is often times the only mechanism available to school districts to increase revenue. revenues available to schools are fixed and inflexible due to various laws. Did you know that Twinsburg City School District's (TCSD) revenues have increased only \$288,937 over the last ten years? Our Schools - Our Kids.

While proceeds from an operating levy can be used by a board of education for any legal expenditure, the cost of education continually rises. Many of the rising costs cannot be controlled by the local school boards. School districts encounter inflation in most goods and services. In addition to unfunded mandates and legal requirements, expanded services expected by communities add to increased operating costs. The funds derived from operating levies are used



85% for salaries and benefits for personnel-we are a service organization. The remaining 15% is used for items such as classroom supplies, insurance, utilities, software, busing and maintenance and repairs. Our Schools - Our Kids.

Most people do not know the state's formula for funding schools reduces the amount of funding it sends to Twinsburg City School District to \$1,388 per pupil. However, the state deducts \$6,634 from TCSD for each student enrolled in a charter school. This is almost five times what TCSD receives per student that is being deducted and redirected to charter schools (\$1,388 x 4.78 = \$6,634). Our Schools - Our Kids.

In May 2017, U.S. News and World Report ranked Twinsburg High School number 46 in Ohio out of 886 and number 1152 in the U.S. out of more than 22,000 high schools. This means Twinsburg High School ranks in the top 5% of all high schools nationally. Because of conservative fiscal policy this has been accomplished while containing costs. According to the Ohio Department of Education's 2016 Cupp Report, Twinsburg City School District spends almost \$500 less per pupil than

state average and \$2,000 to \$4,000 less per pupil than some of our neighboring school districts. Our Schools Our Kids.

When you think about it, what else but their responsibility to the education of the children of our community would cause a local board of education to choose to suffer the slings and arrows which local levies commonly cause? Our Schools Our Kids.

The public will ultimately determine the quality of the Twinsburg City School District.
