




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
Instruction Groups are generated based on the latest available assessment data. The observed patterns noted for the group are the specific behaviors displayed in the group, • which helps to further target instruction. Can produce the primary common letter sounds but does not blend the sounds into words. Need to work on blending sounds to read CVC words. Work on blending CVC words by blending individual sounds or blending onset-rimes, and then Language Considerations recoding. Use words with continuous sounds until students understand how to blend. ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNER LANGUAGE VARIETY Continuous sounds, such as /m/, /s/, /n/, and /f/ are easier to blend; elongate each sound to make it easier to blend them into the word (e.g., ffffffaaaaaannnnnn). Highlight sounds and letter combinations present and not present in the child's native language. Include extra modeling and examples of words that include the sounds and letter combinations Provide students exposure to vocabulary and comprehension instruction through teacher readalouds and oral instruction. During instruction, use words whose meaning the student understands so the focus can be on alphabetic principle and basic phonics. Prerequisite skills: - Phonemic awareness in orally blending sounds in spoken words. - Letter sounds of common letters. *Students who are unable to blend sounds may need intervention on phonemic awareness and letter-sound correspondence.






Are student wearables (smart watches) a distraction to the learning environment?






How effective do you feel the new District PCD Policy is with the requirement that students must place their cell phone/devices in District issues caddies?




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
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

- Prevent weapons and harmful items in buildings/events
- \$8,000 investment from Safety & Security grant funds

- Communication will be sent to families and students regarding the process and expectations




Facilities

- partner with Ohio Facilities Construction Commission (OFCC) through Expedited Local Partnership Program (ELPP) to update the Facilities Master Plan and enrollment projections to further develop options for the Tiger Legacy Project.
- continue to update the Facilities Master Plan to ensure proper and strategic annual expenditures so that all projects align with the plan and that expenses can be supported through the Permanent Improvement fund.

Culture and Climate

During the 2023/24 school year, the TCSD will

- identify, implement, and evaluate a menu of research based interventions and supports including the Social-Emotional Learning Curriculum which address mental health challenges.
- create and support a culture of equity where staff and students feel included and experience a positive sense of belonging as demonstrated by improved attendance and a decrease in student discipline.
- consistently implement Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) across all buildings as measured by the MTSS audit at the conclusion of the 23-24 school year.

Student Mental Health

LifeAct- Suicide Prevention

- Under House Bill 123- SAVE Students Act, Schools must provide annual training to students on suicide prevention and awareness.
- Twinsburg has partnered with LifeAct to provide this curriculum to our students.
- As of 11/15/2023 Students in grades 6-10 have been provided with this program. Grades 11 and 12 are scheduled for the second quarter



Senate Bill 288

Under Senate Bill 288, health education now requires schools and districts to provide instruction on child sexual abuse prevention to students in grades K-6 and instruction on dating violence prevention and sexual violence prevention to students in grades 7-12.

The legislation also requires school personnel to receive in-service training on child sexual abuse.

The District is exploring options for ways to present this education in an age appropriate to our students at all levels.





 - During August and September 2023 we switched to electronic invoicing. All our checks/invoices/purchase orders and purchase requisitions along with quotes received are kept electronically in SC View, starting with FY24
 - We introduced the option to deposit payroll in up to 3 accounts (opposed to just 1) in August 2023
 - Treasurer's electronic signature on Salary Notices was implemented August 2023
 - Different forms available to be submitted electronically internally to the Treasurer's Office

Finance

- Implement and evaluate new online tools used to increase efficiencies in the Treasurer's Office and Twinsburg City School District operations.
 - SC View's helpful handouts and "How to's" presented by the Treasurer
 - Internal Accounting Procedures booklet released July 2023 for all staff members
 - PaySchools implemented for parents to electronically pay fees online
 - MySchoolBucks implemented for lunch fees online payment option
 - Assistant Treasurer trains new administrative assistant staff members on the Accounting and Electronic Requisition systems



Finance

During the 2023/24 school year, the TCSD will

- further research funding options for the Tiger Legacy Project and present to the Board of Education for their consideration.
 - Financing options will be discussed and determined by the Board once the District receives facilities assessment data from the OFCC.
