### **Keep Students Safe and Comfortable**

Through the generosity of our communities, we receive approximately \$2 million annually in Permanent Improvement Funds. The District works hard to ensure that planned projects fit within this budget, so as not to stress the General Fund. The District also seeks numerous grant opportunities yearly for school buses, energy projects, and more. Projects and purchases completed during the summer included:

### Asphalt & Paving

Asphalt, concrete, paving, seal coating, and striping needs were completed across the District.

#### Roofing

The District partnered with Garland Roofing, who conducted a full forensic assessment of all roofs and components. Roofing repairs were also completed at RB Chamberlin Middle School and the Transportation building.

#### Heating, Ventilation & Air Conditioning

Through an energy conservation and efficiency partnership with Gardiner, the District worked through upgrading hardware and software components of all HVAC systems.

### Room Renovations at George G. Dodge Intermediate School

The former Band Room and Vocal Music Room were each converted from one large space to two separate classrooms.

#### Stadium/Water Drainage Mitigation

Erosion on the backside of the District's home stands from water runoff has been a frequent problem. This summer, a trench and backfill were implemented from the maintenance garage up to the stadium to mitigate further issues.

#### Athletics

Gym floors were resurfaced, and the softball dugouts had roofs installed. Electricity was established in the backstop area at the softball diamond as well.

### **Technology Investments**

The following investments were made in the District's technology infrastructure: interactive flat panels, new desktop monitors, USB-C docking stations, the continuation of the four-year replacement cycle of Chromebooks, staff computer replacement protocols, and responsible recycling of old technology.

### Wayfinding Signage

Helpful signage is being installed around District properties. This was in response to valued community feedback on how to help better navigate District facilities.

### Safety & Security

A facilities audit was conducted to assess doors, locks, security cameras, and more. The Board of Education approved five Security Liaison positions who are primarily assigned to security during the afterschool and evening hours.

# Letters, Sounds, and Words... Oh, my!

### Learning to Read in the Primary Grades



Reading and writing are complex processes that require our brains to decipher a great deal of information quickly. However, a stepby-step, structured approach is the best practice in helping children create a basic understanding of word patterns as they learn to read. At Wilcox Primary School, teachers are engaged in a deep study of what has been named the "Science of Reading." The Science of Reading is based on many different research studies over decades, pointing to a convergence of evidence that shows what works in early literacy instruction. Learning to read for understanding requires two main components: word recognition (decoding sounds) and language comprehension (developing a rich vocabulary to make meaning of words and sentences). Wilcox Primary School teachers have actively participated in book studies, podcasts, and professional development to build their capacity as early literacy experts.

Teachers at Wilcox Primary School apply the Science of Reading through explicit daily lessons in whole and small group instruction during their literacy block. For phonological and phonemic awareness in Preschool, Kindergarten, and first grade, teachers utilize a program called Heggerty, where students practice manipulating sounds by adding, deleting, and changing syllables in highly engaging oral lessons that include a high level of teacher modeling. Students then carry these auditory skills to the written word in decodable books and the Fundations phonics program. Sequential word patterns are practiced through reading, writing, and the use of letter boards to "build" words. Shared read-alouds allow all students to experience rich vocabulary by learning new words and words with multiple meanings. Discussions about high-quality literature help students recall details, retell stories, and make connections to build language comprehension.

Early literacy classrooms, like those at Wilcox Primary School, are language-rich, active places where students are engaged in word study that is often disguised as play or a fun game. The Science of Reading is a complex "recipe" with the same ingredients, but the proportions change for each child as they grow into skilled readers.



Samual Bissell Elementary School building administrators Mrs. Misty Johnson and Mr. Scott Winter held 25 individual classroom conversations during the first week of school. The purpose of the meetings was to share PBIS (Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports) expectations with students, which included an overview of the different office recognitions students can receive for making positive behavior choices.

The State of Ohio will again recognize Samuel Bissell Elementary School for positively rewarding student achievement and behavior! The PBIS Bronze Award is given to schools implementing school-wide supports at the Tier I Level. The school's plan consists of various reward systems and performing kind acts. Before this school year, Samuel Bissell was last recognized as a Bronze recipient in 2018.

Fathers and father figures enjoyed a nice morning walk to school with their children on September 22. Approximately 325 fathers, grandfathers, uncles, brothers, godfathers, cousins, or other significant male caregivers walked their children to school as part of the Northeast Ohio Father/Father Figures Initiative – Fathers Walk. The idea behind the event is to highlight the importance of males in their child's education. Before the event ended, the Samuel Bissell Elementary School PTA gave attendees a treat bag.



### RB Chamberlin Highlights

- RB Chamberlin Middle School sent students to Washington, D.C., for the first time in three years. The trip this year was scheduled for October 11-13.
- The middle school was again able to host parents for the Seventh Grade Orientation Night and the middle school Open House. Both of these events were well attended.
- RB Chamberlin Middle School was again awarded the Gold Medal for Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports (PBIS) by the Ohio Department of Education. The middle school was one of four Summit County schools to receive the award. This is the third consecutive year RBC was recognized as a PBIS Gold Medal School.

- Thank you to the Boys' Soccer Team for their patriotic gesture in remembrance of the lives lost on 9/11. The team placed flags on the front lawn of Twinsburg High School to commemorate this solemn occasion.

### A New Era Begins in Treasurer/CFO Office



I joined the Twinsburg City School District on August 1, 2022, as the Treasurer/Chief Financial Officer, and I was part of the Twinsburg Support Staff Association negotiations on my first day. During my first month, I engaged in different District-wide initiatives, such as strategic planning, collaborating to define educational equity, discussing safety and security protocols, to name just a few. In addition, I made it a priority to become familiar with the District's fiscal history and focus on the District's finances and the efficiencies of the specific internal fiscal processes. At the same time, I reached out to the administrators

and school principals to identify how my office could better assist students and parents.

In June 2022, the Board of Education contacted two professionals, K-12 Consulting Inc. and the North Coast Shared Services Alliance, and requested reviews of the District's most recently submitted Five-Year Forecast. Both concluded that the May 2022 forecast is reasonably stated. As a result, during the July 13, 2022 regular meeting, the Board of Education declared it necessary to renew the 6.9 mill tax levy for current expenses. The voters first approved this levy in 1993, and it generates \$5.2 million in revenue annually. This amount is close to 10% of the District's total revenues.

While the renewal will help support current operations, due to the District's deficit spending for the last three fiscal years (since COVID), we are looking into every possible opportunity to increase revenues and lower expenses. We were awarded \$313,019 in ESSER I, Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act; \$1,160,943 in ESSER II, Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations (CRRSA) Act, and \$2,625,281 in ESSER II, American Rescue Plan (ARP). We currently have \$1.3 million of the ESSER III Act funds left to address students' academic and socioal/emotional needs during the next two school years or as long as the funds will last. A presentation regarding the use of those funds was held in a public hearing during the Board meeting on September 28.

Additionally, the District has received numerous small grants thanks to our dedicated staff who care to make a difference for the students. I would like to personally express my gratitude to those who seek alternative funding sources. I am excited to meet as many community members as possible during the coming school year.
