

A variety of services provide options to ensure all students receive individualized instruction, enrichment, and support.



Wilcox Primary School teachers, administrators, and instructional assistants completed 18 hours of dyslexia training through the Ohio Department of Education.





- Samuel Bissell Elementary School continued the co-teaching model, where an Intervention Specialist and Classroom Teacher team-teach. This approach benefits all students by promoting inclusion, offering various teaching models, and increasing motivation, ownership of learning, and academic growth.
- Reading and Math Interventionists at Samuel Bissell Elementary School provide targeted support to students, focusing on foundational skills and their application in larger classroom settings.
- Second and third grade teachers collaborate with the District's Gifted Coordinator to create challenging and enriching activities for students demonstrating mastery in academic areas.
- Math extension is offered through the Go Math Series' enrichment activities, providing students with challenging Higher Order Thinking (HOT) questions beyond the standard curriculum.
- The Twinsburg City School District continued its partnership with Beech Brook counseling services, offering extra behavioral or emotional support to identified students, with services continuing throughout the summer.
- School Counselors plan whole-class and individual activities/ lessons to help students identify feelings and manage transitions. Assistance is also provided through the "Check-In, Check-Out" Mentor program.
- RBC teachers were nominated for awards, received grants, and were featured presenters at several statewide conferences.





Student Services (continued)

Professional development targeted to the health and safety of students and staff is always a given top priority. Training is provided annually for a variety of areas, including, but not limited to:

- Crisis Prevention and Intervention (CPI)
- Google Suite
- **Ed Tech Tools**
- Blended Learning
- Voice and Choice
- Science of Reading
- Problem Based Learning (PBL)
- Personalized Learning
- Social Emotional Learning Curriculum

Cuyahoga Valley Career Center (CVCC) Partnership Funds were again awarded to Twinsburg City School District to offset costs that directly support career technology education. A portion of the funds were used to support Project Lead the Way (PLTW) at RB Chamberlin Middle School in an effort to expand STEM programs and support the existing Introduction to Engineering Design (IED) and Principles of Engineering (POE) courses. Funds were also used to support STEM Professional Development.

All new staff are required to participate in A.L.I.C.E. (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate) Training as part of their Emergency Crisis Response plans. These 3-hour sessions are designed to give participants insight and response options when encountering an active shooter.









NEW TEXTBOOKS

Our students will be using rigorous and relevant new textbooks and materials for the following classes:

- The new Motion Graphic 2 class will utilize Adobe Animate Classroom in a Book.
- Biology for the AP will be the updated textbook for the AP Biology course at THS.
- The French 1-4 courses will update to Chemins French for a Connected World


Courses of Study:

- ✓ District-wide Courses of Study were approved and uploaded to the District website. These ever-changing documents illustrate what is being taught in the classroom for each subject.
- ✓ Motion Graphics 2 Course provides students with in-depth instruction in Adobe After Effects. Students are taking this new course in Fall 2023.
- ✓ Writing for Civic Engagement focuses on place-based education, empowering students to take an active role in their community. This shorter read and writing-driven course is offered to all eleventh graders in 2023-2024.
- ✓ AP Macroeconomics expands the college-level offerings in Economics. This ideal course for students interested in a business curriculum is offered in Fall 2023.

- Continuation of Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) for students.
- NWEA's Measure of Academic Progress (MAP), which is an online computer adaptive assessment program.
- ✓ Continuing to support the increase in online textbooks and resource components for teachers and students.

The Technology Department supported parents, teachers, and students with on-campus technology needs, including support for Chromebooks, G-Suite products, Screencastify, GoGuardian, Clever, Securly Portal, and many other tools.

- · Updated/replaced Interactive Whiteboards and projectors in classrooms as needed.
- Replaced District copier fleet along with end-of-life District printers.
- Installed Interactive Flat Panels in various classrooms throughout the District.
- Continued to support laptops provided to TCSD teachers.
- Supported PK-12th grade Chromebook repair and replacement.
- Supported PC labs for students enrolled in digital art, photography, and engineering design classes.
- Continued support for students and staff on the integration & use of G-Suite products such as Google Classroom, Google Meet, Forms, Slides, and Jamboard.

During the 2022-2023 school year:

- Over 2 million Google files were created, approximately 2K Google Meets were held, well over 1K Google Classes were created, and over 2 million Google files were shared internally.
- More than 400 new Chromebooks were issued to students in PK-12, over 200 student Chromebooks were replaced, and approximately 1,300 Chromebook repairs were made.
- Over 9,000 posts were made to SeeSaw classes.
- · Almost 9 million questions were answered by 2nd-8th grade students learning content on IXL.
- Just over 142K total minutes were spent by 2nd-6th grade students reading books, listening to books, and practicing comprehension skills in Raz-Kids.
- · Over 500 assessments were assigned to students in grades 9 through 12 via Edulastic.
- THS & RBC teachers created over 960 presentations in Pear Deck.
- Students in second and third grade logged in to BrainPOP Jr 7,858 times, watched 6,519 movies, and submitted 5,805 quizzes.

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Fiscal Stewardship (continued)

- The Twinsburg City School District participates in the Ohio Schools Council Cooperative Purchasing Program for property and liability insurance, fuel purchases, bus and vehicle purchases, utilities, and other significant purchases of supplies and permanent improvement projects. Participation saves the Twinsburg City School District well over \$300,000 each year.
- The Twinsburg City School District also participates in numerous purchasing consortiums such as the AEPA, US Communities, OMNIA Partners, Sourcewell, Sourcing Alliance, and GSA, to ensure the lowest available pricing on numerous supplies and permanent improvement projects.
- By utilizing FMX, our Online Work Order System, we are able to better track expenses, maintenance and repairs on buildings and equipment.
- During the 2022-2023 school year, our Transportation Department further implemented the bus GPS and maintenance system, Zonar, for pupil transportation services.
- Also, our Transportation Department utilized enhanced features in our routing software, Transfinder, to update routes for more timely service.

Tiger Legacy Project Update

In January 2022, the Board of Education and District Leadership resumed talks about the Tiger Legacy Project, which aims to update the District's aging facilities. The Facilities Action Team met again to outline pressing needs, including:

- A new Grades 4-6 school to replace George G. Dodge Intermediate School
- · Moving Tiger Stadium to Twinsburg High School's campus
- Fixing or replacing roofs, playgrounds, and making safety improvements
- · Relocating other athletic spaces affected by construction

By spring 2022, the District had held meetings and launched a survey to involve the community in planning. The majority of survey respondents supported a phased approach for these updates.

As for the next steps, the District is currently focusing on resolving its budget deficit. Once the budget is stabilized, efforts will focus on long-term facility improvements under the Tiger Legacy Project.

NTAINING SCHOOL FACILITIES Major Permanent Improvements for 2022-23 School Year

- Energy Conservation Project upgrades to our HVAC infrastructure, LED lighting retrofits, and improvements to numerous other energy systems have allowed for over \$115,000 in energy savings to date.
- Major asphalt paving and resurfacing at Twinsburg High School, RB Chamberlin Middle School, Wilcox Primary School, Tiger Trail, Paw Point, and other District roadways and parking areas (approximately \$500,000).
- Purchased 2,010 new Chromebooks as part of our Chromebook Replacement Cycle (approximately \$562,800).
- Purchased three (3) buses as part of our ten-year bus replacement cycle (approximately \$324,500).
- HVAC & Public Address System wiring and automation repairs at George G. Dodge Intermediate School.
- The District's playgrounds, bleachers, stages and kilns are inspected regularly to ensure the safety of the students and staff.
- Various roofing repairs were made at all five(5) buildings.
- Various smaller summer projects are based on the Facilities Strategic Plan of 2022 and 2023.

The Twinsburg City School District operates efficiently despite having lower local revenue per pupil compared to peer districts and the statewide average. This underscores the level of effort and resourcefulness required to maintain our high educational standards.

Operations and the November Ballot Issue

The District has placed a 5.9-mill levy on the November 7, 2023, ballot aimed at maintaining our daily operations. This includes funding for teachers, staff, utilities, and educational programs. Here's why:

Fiscal Stewardship (continued)

- · Despite \$2.9 million in spending cuts, the District still encounters a budget shortfall.
- · The financial challenges mainly stem from external elements:
 - » Reduced state funding
 - » Elimination of the Tangible Personal Property tax, leading to a \$24 million loss
 - » House Bill 920 constraints on increasing revenue despite rising property values

· If the levy passes:

- » Financial stability will be achieved to maintain current operations and educational quality
- » This includes keeping current class sizes, transportation routes, and staffing levels
- » Programs aimed at college and career preparation for students will continue

· If the levy fails:

- » Additional cuts in operational costs will be unavoidable
- » This will affect the scope and quality of services and educational programs the Twinsburg City School District can provide

- Ensure educational equity and excellence for each and every student by providing staff members with access to support, tools, and systems to improve student achievement.
- Continue to ensure educational equity and excellence for every student by providing curriculum and programming aligned with preparing globally minded students who are ready to be enrolled, enlisted, and employed. Highly effective professional learning communities will be utilized as a vehicle for examining school, classroom, and individual progress.
- Implement the Career Readiness continuum with fidelity in grades PreK-12 and conduct ongoing evaluation to determine revisions to the continuum.
- Develop an entrepreneurship framework that aligns with the District's Portrait of a Graduate.

CULTURE AND CLIMATE

- Identify, implement, and evaluate a menu of research based interventions and supports including the Social-Emotional Learning Curriculum which address mental health challenges.

- Develop a financial plan which includes implementation of the FY23 Expenditure Reduction Plan to maintain fiscal stability through FY24
- Further research funding options for the Tiger Legacy Project and present to the Board of Education for their consideration.
- Implement and evaluate new online tools used to increase efficiencies in the Treasurer's Office and Twinsburg City School District operations.
- · Continue to provide financial updates to all stakeholders and gather feedback.

COMMUNICATION CO

- Develop and implement a process to communicate to the greater school community in a coordinated, strategic
- Re-engage and gather feedback from community members regarding the Tiger Legacy Project.
- Continue to engage the Equity Steering Committee in further developing the Equity Implementation Plan and involve stakeholders in its implementation.

FACILITIES


- Partner with Ohio Facilities Construction Commission (OFCC) through the Expedited Local Partnership Program (ELPP) to update the Facilities Master Plan and enrollment projections to further develop options for the Tiger Legacy Project.
- Continue to update the Facilities Master Plan to ensure proper and strategic annual expenditures so that all projects align with the plan and that expenses can be supported through the Permanent Improvement fund.
- · Continue community engagement regarding the Tiger Legacy Project in efforts to further refine the plan.

 Facilitate student-oriented groups (Principal Advisory Councils) at each school which are inclusive of student voice and choice and lead to the creation of a safer culture that addresses concerns (e.g. PCDs).

SAFETY

- Implement threat assessment teams with fidelity and evaluate processes to ensure that threats to school security are addressed.
- Implement and evaluate new protocols regarding metal detector wands and student use of PCDs and provide feedback to the Board of Education by February 2024.
