5-Star School District

I am thrilled to announce that the Twinsburg City School District has earned a Five-Star Rating on Ohio's State Report Card. This places us among the top school districts in our local area and across the state. This achievement is a clear reflection of the dedication and

hard work of our students, teachers, and staff and the invaluable support from our community. It emphasizes that investing in our schools is a wise and fruitful endeavor for our students' future and our community's well-being.

Upgraded School Safety Plan

Safety remains our utmost priority. We've updated and enhanced our safety plan, introducing stronger measures and protocols to make sure our students learn in a secure environment every day. We've added more surveillance cameras and radios to improve security and communication.

November Ballot Measure

There's a new levy of 5.9 mills on the November 7th ballot. This is aimed at maintaining our daily operations, keeping our amazing teachers and staff, sustaining our high-quality programs, and covering utilities. The cost? It's \$207 per year per \$100,000 of home value.

Even after reducing \$2.9 million in expenses, we're facing a deficit due to decreased state funding and other factors. If the levy is approved, it will help maintain our current quality and offerings. If not, we may have to make significant reductions and deeper budget cuts.

We encourage everyone to stay informed and join the discussions. Together, we can uphold the tradition of excellence in the Twinsburg City School District and keep our District among the best in the state.

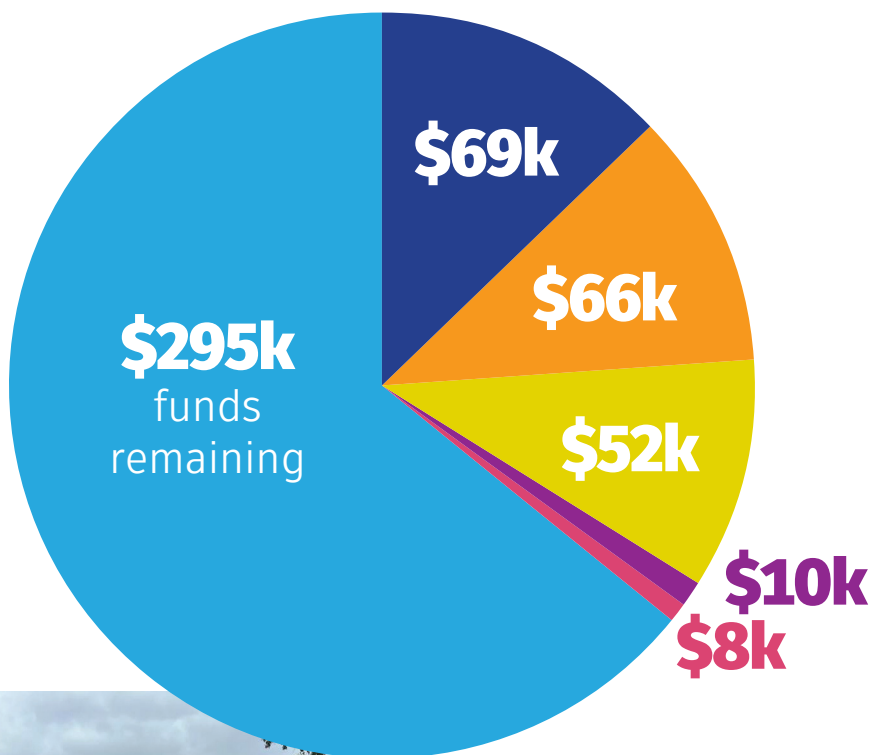
Assistant Principal Michelle Lowden

Twinsburg City School District Receives Safety Grants

In the past year, the Twinsburg City School District has applied for and received \$500,000 in Safety & Security Grants.

Thanks to the support and feedback from the community and staff, we have invested in the following technology and items to provide our students and staff with the safest learning environment possible:



Badge Readers & Security Cameras

We're updating and adding cameras across the District, especially in key outdoor areas. New door access badge readers are being installed.

Handheld Radios

We're acquiring new handheld radios for better staff communication, essential for emergencies.

Vape/Shot Detectors

We're installing detectors at Twinsburg High and RB Chamberlin Middle Schools to detect vape usage and loud noises. These are linked to security cameras to provide timely alerts.

Student ID Badges

New badge readers have been installed at Twinsburg High School's student entrances. Students will have photo IDs, which indicate enrollment status, when scanned.

Metal Detector Wands

Metal detector wands will be intermittently used as a preventative measure at Twinsburg High School, RB Chamberlin Middle School and at District events in an effort to prevent weapons, paraphernalia, or other potentially harmful items from being brought onto our campuses.

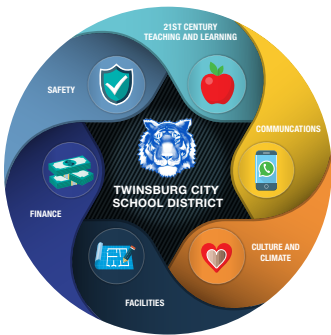

Twinsburg City School District Improves Reading Instruction for Students

Twinsburg City School District is committed to helping all students become successful readers by making changes to our reading instruction to align with the Science of Reading. The changes are based on the latest research on how children learn to read, and they are designed to help all students develop the decoding and comprehension skills they need to succeed.

Students will learn to sound out words by focusing on the individual sounds and patterns in words. Teachers will provide explicit and systematic phonics instruction, and early intervention will be a priority for struggling readers. Students will also have opportunities to practice phonemic awareness skills, the foundation of decoding.

By focusing on decoding and comprehension, the new reading instruction approach being implemented in the Twinsburg City School District is designed to help all students develop the skills they need to succeed.

PARENTS CAN HELP BY:

- Encouraging their children to read every day
- Talking to their children about what they are reading
- Asking their children to sound out words they don't know
- Providing opportunities for phonemic awareness practice
- Working with their children on decodable readers
- Monitoring progress and contacting the teacher with concerns

Property Values and Its Impact on Twinsburg City School District

Per Ohio Law, the county auditor or fiscal officer is tasked with setting the market value of properties every six years. This was done in Summit County in 2020. Every three years, they perform a property reappraisal update, which in Summit County was done this year (to take effect in January 2024). Reports indicate that property values are expected to have a 31.4% average increase. Similar and in some cases even higher growth is being reported in other areas across the state.

Does the District Receive More Money as Property Increases in Value?

No, except for inside millage. Voted school revenue does not increase as property values increase. In October 1976, the Ohio Legislature literally stopped increases in voted tax revenue to schools as a result of the increased valuation of property by approving House Bill 920. As a result, schools are locked into income from the tax valuations in place at the time a levy is passed. As a result, it does not factor in any inflation over the years.

What is the Difference Between Unvoted and Voted Millage?

Unvoted millage, also known as inside millage, is levied by local governments without a vote of the people. The maximum allocation of inside millage is 10 mills and is divided between county, school district, municipalities, and/or the township of each taxing district. The Twinsburg City School District receives 4.97 mills in this category.

Voted millage, also known as outside millage, is approved by a vote of the people. No outside millage can be collected without a majority vote from the voters in that specific community.

What is a Mill?

A mill is 1/10 of one penny. For example, 1 mill produces \$1 in tax income for every \$1,000 of assessed property value.

Is it True that the Current Millage is Less than the Total Previously Voted?

Yes. Because of increased property values, the full-voted levy would raise more money than authorized. Therefore, HB920 requires millages to be lowered to an *effective millage* rate, so taxes do not generate an increase in revenue due to an increase in valuation as a result of reappraisal or triennial update.

How Will the November Ballot Issue Affect Your Taxes?

The Twinsburg City School District has a ballot issue coming up this November, for an additional 5.9 mills in property taxes, which will bring the District \$6,210,000 /year during its 10 year term - if passed. This additional funding is critical for maintaining daily operations, including the salaries of teachers and support staff, as well as sustaining educational programs and utilities. The added cost for a household is \$207 per year for every \$100,000 of the home's market value.
